
A truly miscellaneous *sammelband* of fourteen works, both devotional and didactic, including; an unrecorded Marlborough printed sermon on the certainty of God's decree for the Resurrection of the dead; an apparently unrecorded doctoral dissertation on melancholy, submitted by Robert Lindoe (d. 1848) to Dutch Reformed theologian Broërius Broes (1757-1799); antiquary and Anglican clergyman Richard Warner's (1763-1857) analysis of archaeological discoveries made at Bath; and four sermons by sometime Bishop of Bath and Wells George Law (1761-1845), two of which presentation copies, one seemingly inscribed to Warner himself.

Another intriguing inclusion is a scarce poem 'The Follies of Oxford', occasionally attributed to Cornish clergyman **Richard Polwhele (1760-1838)**, concerning the tribulations of a university undergraduate:

'Thus though 'tis theirs to guide our Youth Where science points to taste and truth, These sages cloud with Scowl austere The Paths of science, dark and drear, And, with the noblest Joys at Strife Quench the fair Satr of social Life!'

#### CRICKET BALLS AND COMMON LAW

'The Common-Law send matters into Chancery; so that a Client is banded about like a Cricket-ball, till they have beat out all his Estate'.

The first edition of the maiden comedy of Thomas Baker (c. 1680-1749), playwright and lawyer. Little is known of Baker's life, but his character is disparaged in John Mottley's *List of Dramatic Authors with some Account of their Lives* (1747), in which he is described as 'A man of strange turn, imperious and clamorous upon topics of no service towards the promoting of true religion in his parish, and not a little addicted to stiff and dividing principles'. Thomas Durfey, in the preface to his *Modern Prophets, or New Wit for a Husband* (c. 1709), briefly discusses Baker and his works, describing him as a 'bloody male critick', and condemns the 'plotless and trifling quality' of his dramatic works, of which all were comedies.

The brief reference to cricket found on page 22 serves as an early literary invocation of the sport in metaphor.



An uncommon Colombo-printed pamphlet, preserved in original state, concerning Buddhist metaphysics, specifically the Abhidhamma Pitaka, the scholastic analysis of the Buddha's teachings recorded in the Suttas. The collection of essays, edited by German anthropologist Adolf Bastian (1826-1905), includes one entitled Heladiw Ruvana by Chandrhat Chudhathar, Prince of Siam, as well as various extracts from the Ceylon Standard.



The sole edition, in original unsophisticated state, of philosopher, jurist, and reformer Jeremy Bentham's (1748-1832) critique of a draft penal code prepared by the Cortes Generales during the Trienio Liberal, which member José Maria Queipo de Llano Ruiz de Saravia, conde de Toreno (1786-1843) - recently returned from exile in order to serve the revolutionary parliament - had sent to Bentham for review.



A rare survival - in the original state - of the January 1839 catalogue of English publisher Richard Bentley (1794-1871), whose *Standard Novels* series - which first appeared in 1831 - popularized the single-volume format for popular English novels. By securing copyright to the works, and publishing the works 'in neatly bound pocket volumes, price Six Shillings each, printed and embellished with engravings', Bentley's *Standard Novels* were immensely successful. Perhaps surprisingly, given this success, it is not advertised until pp30-31 of this catalogue, preceded by newly issued novels, histories and travel books.

Included amongst the list are '9. *Frankenstein*, by Mrs Shelley', which was issued with the first part of Schiller's *Ghost Seer* bound in. This edition had been heavily revised by Shelley, as was the custom of the series, with an entirely rewritten first chapter. Listed under nos. 23, 25, 27, 28 and 30, respectively, are the five volumes of Jane Austen's novels.

Rather charmingly, the final page bears an advert addressed to "The Book-Clubs and proprietors of Circulating Libraries of the United Kingdom', in which 'Mr. Bentley begs to acquaint' members with his reduction in the price of his new novels, 'from 10s. and 6d. to 8s per volume', including Oliver Twist, and further planned works by Dickens, Bulwer Lytton and G.P.R. James'.

This catalogue, perhaps unsurprisingly given the ephemeral nature, is unrecorded in the usual databases.



A fine, royal octavo copy of Thomas Bewick's (1753-1828) celebrated catalogue of mammalian species.

First published in 1790, the book cemented Bewick's reputation as one of the foremost wood-engravers operating in Britain. The work was begun as early 1781, with the descriptive text supplied primarily by Bewick's colleague **Ralph Beilby (bap. 1743, d. 1817)**; it proved immensely popular, reaching seven editions by 1820 totalling some 14,000 copies.

'The Christian Religion improves and advances the Perception of Pleasure to its highest pitch, and yields an inexhausted Treasure of incomparably more solid Joys...which manifestly shews the falsity of the Objection, That it dooms Men to perpetual Melancholy'.

The sole edition of the second published work of Rector of Little Ilford, Essex, Robert Blakeway; a conciliatory treatise calculated to comfort zealous Protestants given to melancholy due to their assiduous devotion to practical piety.



'This being the first Book of the Kind ever presented to the Public, the Editor is well aware, that at its first Appearance, it will cause much Altercation in the different Lodges, with respect to its Contents; for although he has by no Means revealed any of their Solemn Mysteries, he expects it will meet such Opposition, that many will condemn it'.

A fourth located copy of the first edition of a late eighteenth-century masonic *vade mecum* containing a ciphered exposure of the order's rituals.

The elusive John Browne evidently issued these 'questions' concerning the Freemason's craft in cryptographic form to allay accusations that he had betrayed his obligation as a member to never disclose the secrets of the order. The cipher (at least once known) is uncomplicated; the vowels, as well as 'y', are transposed with the letters of the author's surname, thus 'a,e,i,o,u,y' becomes 'b,r,o,w,n,e'.

The work is appended with a register of lodges, Grand Lodge Officers, Red Apron Lodges, and Royal Arch Chapters. A second, and final edition appeared in 1802; notably, this issue included ciphered 'answers' to the questions posed in this edition.



An impassioned contribution to the heated war of words fought over the state of the financial security of France between sometime Controllers-General of Finances under Louis XVI, Charles Alexandre de Calonne (1734-1802) and Jacques Necker (1732-1804).

Calonne's pamphlet, issued in response to Necker's *Sur le compte rendu au Roi en 1781*. *Nouveaux éclaircissemens* (1788), states his intention to publish a full rebuttal of Necker's criticism's his tenure as administrator of finances (1784-1787). Necker, then recently reinstated as Controller-General as the country was on the verge of bankruptcy, had attacked Calonne for the failure of his reform schemes, notably his proposition to increase taxation of privileged nobles and clerics - an effort which precipitated the crisis which triggered the French Revolution.



A sumptuously bound copy of a missal for the use of the laity, first published in 1837, translated and edited by the English Catholic clergyman Frederick Charles Husenbeth (1792-1872), a major figure in early nineteenth century English religious controversies. A prolific author, he was especially critical of Faberism, the evangelical theories propounded by the Anglican theologian George Stanley Faber.

An expanded edition, posthumously published in the same year as the first, of Church of England clergyman William Chafin's (1733-1818) sketches of Wiltshire gamekeepers and enduring battle with poachers on the lands surrounding Salisbury.

Job Lousley (1790-1855), English landowner, farmer, antiquarian and bibliophile. He lived at Blewbury and Hampstead Norris, near Newbury; an avid and idiosyncratic book-collector, with an eye for the curious and unusual, the books from his library, often bear forthright inscriptions relating his opinions of the contents, or his other encounters with the work.



The second edition of the first printed comic opera of James Cobb (1756-1818), English librettist. The opera's premier performance is said to have been the first singing appearance of celebrated Anglo-Irish actress Dorothea Jordan (1761-1816), courtesan of Prince William, Duke of Clarence.

#### A GAME WITH A 'TWIST'

Preserved within the rare publisher's two-part glazed cream box, with front and rear of lower portion featuring a coloured title ('The characters of Charles Dickens. An interesting game' and illustration of Mr. Pickwick) and an advertisement for another Jacques game ('Bumble Puppy' respectively). A crisp set, with just occasional marking; some loss/splitting to box at edges.

A late Victorian edition, produced by Jaques of Hatton Garden, of a rare card game, for eight or fewer people, consisting of 13 'quartettes of characters from the works of CHARLES DICKENS'. Of these 13, ten feature a drawing and description of a character from within one of the author's novels (Oliver Twist, Barnaby Rudge, Curiosity Shop (sic), Chuzzlewit, Pickwick, Dombey & Son, The Chimes, Cricket on the Hearth, The Haunted Man and Bleak House), and three (Little Dorrit, David Copperfield and The Christmas Books) feature text only, and no illustration.











'Having sorted their cards, the game is commenced by the player on the left of the dealer playing one of his cards...for example, supporting a character in 'Bleak House' is played, 'Smallweed,' 'Mrs Bagnet,' 'Jo,' and 'Turveydrop,' will form a trick, which the last player may take.' The game is completed, as the rule card explains, when three tricks of four cards are held by the same player.

The box containing this rare card game provides interesting details; in addition to the original pricing ('Price One Shilling'), we can see from the price label of 'John E. Stafford' of Brighton that this was sold there for Eight and three quarter pence.

OCLC locates just two examples of this rare game (Chicago and Harvard); COPAC adds one further, at Manchester.







The sole edition of an uncommon work on female impersonation by French writer O.P. Gilbert, translated by Robert Bruce Douglas (1848-1927). The cases within are diverse, documenting numerous individuals of varying classes and occupations within French communities.

Assessing the historical record, it seems likely that at least two of the figures discussed are early examples of transgender women in French society. Much of the work recounts the life of the **Chevalier D'Eon (1728-1810)**, French diplomat, fencer, and spy, whose gender was heavily debated by French society; she was legally pronounced female by King Louis XVI and under English law, with her assigned sex only revealed upon autopsy. She was admired by feminist pioneers Mary Wollstonecraft and Olympe de Gouges, who applauded her bravery. The author also devotes two chapters to the enigmatic **Henriette Jenny Savalette de Lange (1786-1858)**, a French pensioner who lived in Versailles Palace for many years. Her assigned sex was only recorded as she was prepared for burial; she had lived as a woman her entire life.



Another chapter of the book is devoted to **Philippe I, Duke of Orléans (1640-1701)**, whose reputation for effeminacy at court was influenced in part by his long string of male lovers, and in part by his enthusiasm for cross-dressing and adopting women's roles in formal settings, such as balls and parties. The French abbé **François-Timoléon de Choisy (1644-1724)**, who is also featured, was allegedly dressed in girls' clothing by his mother until the age of eighteen. He continued to wear women's clothing as an adult, receiving criticsm from the Duc de Montausier, upon which he travelled further afield to Burgundy and enjoyed the tranquility of rural life.



'It is doubtful whether the manuscript of the author was originally intended for publication. Probably when writing it, he only sought his own amusement. When it came into the hands of the editor, it appeared to him to exhibit a very lively picture of the evils of gaming, and that it might operate as a useful lesson to those who might be unwarily exposed to temptations of this king'.

The sole edition of an anonymous moralistic novel in the guise of the confessions of an inveterate gambler. The unnamed titular gamester - raised in a God-fearing, upright, and affluent household - though no scholar, attends Cambridge University and upon graduation enlists in the army. As with academia, this career proves of little interest to him. When he is suspended failing to promptly return from leave, rather than return home and face the ire of his father, turns to the gaming table to raise finances. This swiftly devolves into addiction, and our anti-hero commences a tour of the country, playing at roulette and on occasion betting on the horses. Our protagonist is only saved from a life of iniquity by the discovery that due to his gambling he has failed to meet the terms of his lately deceased father's will and as such has lost out on £20,000. He retires from the tables, though intriguingly continues to gamble from time to time, but purely in a recreational capacity.

Garside, Raven and Schowerling note that NSTC records the editor as 'J. Peers'. John Peers is the attributed as the author of *Typical Instruction* (1828), also published by Hatchard.

A rare account, printed in the Channel Islands and preserved in original state, of a strident defence of the historical privileges granted to the Island of Guernsey traced since 'the patrimonial Inheritance of our most gracious Sovereign...William the Conqueror', occasioned by attempts made by Westminster to restrict the Islanders' cherished 'free trade' by establishing a Customs House at St. Peter Port in 1805.

In impassioned language, Le Merchant, who signs the work at end, and dates it April 10, refers to historical precedent, Charters and guarantees of monarchs including Queen Elizabeth and Charles II, in order to justify the legal independence of Guernsey. Abortive attempts had previously been made - by the powers at Westminster- as far back as the first decade of the eighteenth-century - to restrict the smuggling that emanated from the Channel Islands by setting up a customs post. The 1805 Act for the 'more effectual Prevention of Smuggling' was initially ignored by the administration in Guernsey, who refused to officially register the Act, presumably citing the same objections as the author of this pamphlet.







A coherent *sammelband* of eighteenth-century devotional dialogues, predominantly comprised of hagiographic funereal sermons; a notable exception being the sole edition of an anonymous discourse concerning Christian forgiveness.

The pamphlet, attributed in an early manuscript hand to Church of England clergyman Thomas Hall, evaluates the Epistle to the Hebrews 8:12 'For I will be merciful to their Unrighteousness, and their Sins and their Iniquities will I remember no more'. The opening lines make clear that this is not the first occasion that the author has considered this subject. Previously, we learn, that the exoneration of transgressions had been discussed doctrinally, however in this instance the author proposes to consider forgiveness 'casuistically or practically', posing the pertinent question 'How shall any know that they are the happy Persons whose Sins are forgiven, or how may we know whether our Sins are forgiven, or not?'





A naively constructed, and all the more charming for it, *sammelband* featuring several eighteenth-century rarities; including the second edition of eighteenth-century conversion narrative, in which a Native American named Laurence Harlow purportedly recounts, in a letter to his Maryland kinsman Drurow, how he 'left Maryland...bound for London', encountering varied Christian beliefs (and the decidedly unchristian views and actions amongst the sailors) both en route and after his arrival:

'In working the ship, they often called upon God to damn their eyes, their hands, their heat, and their blood; in short, they were more mad with rage, than our Indian soldiers, when closely pressed by the enemy in the field of battle; and see he did no destoy their members, when intreated to do so, I concluded their God was deaf, or else so compassionate, that he pitied and spare them for the sake of his own goodness.'

The plot twist in the narrative reflects, presumably, a non-conformist stance from the writer; it is not from Christian words heard, or services witnessed, that turn Harlow's heart to God, but the words of the Bible, a copy of which he finds neglected in his lodgings:

'I resolved to rear it over and over again, and then compare the manners of the Christians with what was contained in this book. I spent near three weeks in the reading and study of it, and found it the most pleasing piece I ever net with; for though I had read over some part of it several times, the matter was still new. I compared it to a fountain, of which every passenger may freely drink, yet it is still overflowing...I confess, my friend, the reading this book had such effect upon my mind, as I never felt before'.

A popular text that went through many editions, the earlier examples of this significant early reference to a Native American conversion are now tremendously rare. Of the first edition, printed in the same year, ESTC locates just three copies (Harvard, Marietta and NYPL), and of this second, just two other copies. We also cannot locate any copy having passed through the rooms in living memory.


Other highlights include an otherwise unrecorded Devonian printed form of prayer for the (penultimate) defeat of Napoleon, and the third known copy of a rare collection of poorly-printed Canterbury published devotional verse, in which the author - Simon Goodwin, of whom little is known outside internal evidence which suggests that he was 'Schoolmaster of Maidtsone' (sic), that it was written in his youth, and published posthumously by the 'widow of the author' who ventured 'to send forth this little production into the world, flattering herself that when the above particulars are considered, the severity of criticism will be laid aside', quoting Pope as justification:

'Of old, those met rewards who could excel And such were prais'd who but endeavour'd well'.





An extensive archive of manuscript letters, notifications, and announcements concerning the early operations of the General Board of Commissioners in Lunacy for Scotland.

Established by the Lunacy (Scotland) Act of 1857, the Board served as the centralised authority for the superintendence of the administration (and foundation) of district asylums and management of provisions for the mentally ill.

The majority of the correspondence are directly addressed to, or concerned with, Sir John Powlett Orde, 2nd Baronet (1803-1878). In 1826, Orde married Eliza Campbell, eldest daughter and co-heir of Peter Campbell, of Kilmory, Argyll. Orde's father-in-law died in Jamaica in 1828 and upon the death of his wife in 1829 he inherited the family estates in Argyllshire and plantations in Jamaica.

Several of the letters are directed to Orde by temperance reformer William Forbes Mackenzie (1807-1862), second chairman of board from 1859 to 1863; others are in the hand of Alexander Mitchell, Clerk to the Argyll District Lunacy Board (of which Orde was evidently a member) - and notably the compiler of a report on the impoverished mentally ill of the Highlands - at least two of which concern the proposed construction of what would become the Argyll and Bute District Asylum, opened in 1863. In relation to said institution, the archive includes letters to Orde from architect David Cousin (1809-1878) explaining his plans for the building, including recommendations for fencing the property.





The first edition of English publisher Francis Newbery's (1743-1818) collection of classical verse translations, inscribed to politician Robert Williams (1767-1847) of Bridehead, Dorset.

Newbery, the son of John Newbery, a publisher himself, was most notorious for facilitating the sale of his patented James's Fever Powder, the taking of which likely caused the death of his frequent publishing client, poet Oliver Goldsmith, in a failed attempt to treat a suspected kidney infection. In response, Newbery published a lengthy defence of his medicine in an attempt to bolster its reputation. Seemingly his only published poetry collection, much of the volume's content is formed of his translations of Horace's second book of Epistles; several of his lighter compositions were set to music by English composers William Crotch and John Callcott.



'Rest is the great refreshment of decayed nature, whereby she recovers new strength and vigour, after she hath been spent and exhausted by tough labour of the body, by long continuous and multiplied dangers, by sharp and incessant cares, by alternate fears and hopes, by the vicissitudes and revolutions of comforts and discontents, which being violent and high in proportion to their causes and occasions, doe afflict the mind, and tyre and decay the spirits.'

A rare, evocative and entirely nuanced collection of 44 meditations on the military, social, economic and psychological impacts of siege warfare, printed in Civil War Oxford likely just after the lifting of the third siege there in 5 years.

Madan rather simplistically describes the work as 'a series of short sermons on the Art of Fortification. Each Part has a practical beginning and a moral end', before allowing that they 'collectively deal with all the aspects in which a siege presents itself to the combatants'. However, this inadequate summary rather misses the subtle point of the whole; a powerful collection of the manifold issues and effects that siege warfare has on both attacker and defender, by the author who had, as a King's Chaplain, incorporated at Oxford in August 1645, almost certainly experienced the siege firsthand:

'Amongst the many waies of enmity, whereby in a declared Warre men use to expresse their endeavours to ruine one another; This of a Seige is the sharpest and the saddest, if we consider the difficultly both of assayling and defending'.




Madan's short synopsis focuses upon the practical and military aspects of this work: 'The 10th, 20th, 30th and 40th meditations, for example, are of shooting-stones, of trenches and batteries, of case shot, of stripping (prisoners)', but fails to mention those elements of the work which set it apart as a work of literature or social history, rather than a military guide. Thankfully, more recent scholarship has reappraised the piece. George Turner's *Humphrey Peake and Siege Warfare (Midlands Historical Review*, Vol. 2, 2018) goes so far as to suggest that 'Peake's work has been sorely overlooked by historians, with his conscious appreciation of the socio-economic side of sieges making Meditations a source that should be held in much higher esteem'. It draws attention specifically to the psychological effects of hunger (which Peake calls 'the cruellest engine whereby to subdue the strongest resolutions') and the need for constant alertness, resulting in the besieged experiencing trauma both physical and mental.

Biographical details of the author are scant aside from those recorded in public records. Cambridge alumni records suggest he was born in 1592, and matriculated at Trinity College in 1613, before proceeding as a scholar (1614), BA (1617), and finally MA (1621), after he had been ordained both deacon (1619) and priest (1620). His High-Church views did not harm his clerical career; he was made a prebend of Lincoln (1626-45), the Rector of Acrise, in Kent, from 1627 - the same year he was appointed a Chaplain to the King - and served as a Canon of Canterbury Cathedral from 1633 until his ejection in 1645. At this point he clearly travelled to the King's court in Oxford, and was incorporated as Doctor of Divinity in August of 1645; the year of his death.

Rare both commercially and institutionally. This very copy, previously in the Cottesloe military library - 'probably the most extensive private collection of early printed books focused on military matters', assembled by **Thomas Francis Fremantle**, **3rd Lord Cottesloe** (1862-1965) - is the only example that we could locate as having troubled the gavel in the rooms. Similarly, ESTC locates copies at just three libraries worldwide: BL, Cambridge and Oxford.

His son, **Sir George Pretyman Tomline (1750-1827)** served as Bishop of Lincoln and later Bishop of Winchester; he was an influential confidant of William Pitt the Younger and a staunch opponent of Catholic emancipation.



A gourmet and gourmand, Prince Albert entertained lavishly. The frequent dinner parties held at the Prince's London residence, ever exceedingly opulent and indolent in equal measure, led to those who regularly attending being dubbed the Marlborough House Set, a group, who counted among their number members of the Rothschild, Sassoon, and Cassel families, often beset by scandal





William Riley Parker notes in his 1968 biography of the great poet that although Milton certainly believed that the manuscript he edited was by Raleigh, proclaiming in the preface that it would be 'a kind of Injury to withhold longer the Work of so eminent an Author from the Publick', it is unlikely that the attribution was accurate.

A rare and complete photographic memorial of the Great Thessaloniki Fire of August 1917, which destroyed in excess of 9,000 houses whilst burning for 32 hours, leading to the emigration of around half the Jewish population of Greece's second city.

These evocative photographs, taken in the immediate aftermath by the RFC and Royal Engineering Survey Company, depict the extent of the damage. There is something almost brutalist in the presentation of the collection, the folder blocked in harsh fonts on cement-coloured paper, which further emphasises the images of total destruction that lay within.



The plates of flora and fauna in this edition are copied from the 1707 Amsterdam edition, with 15 figures on five places, and include Walrusses, a Rhinoceros and a Crocodile, in addition to views of, *inter alia*, Fort de la Victoire in Ambon and a shipwreck.



A collection of 23 seemingly original manuscript sonnets, compiled by an anonymous author for the similarly unidentifiable 'S.J.H.'

The verse bears significant Wordsworthian influence; the volume begins with a transcription of Wordsworth's 'Scorn not the Sonnet' (1827), a defence of the sonnet form, and the individual sonnets borrow several of the great poet's motifs with rather heavy-handed transliteration. Sonnet No. XIX, for instance, which begins 'As glide the waters of this stream away', invokes the typically Wordsworthian imagery of the 'stream' of time, most notably observed in the Romantic poet's *Sonnets from The River Duddon: After-Thought*, in which he muses on nature's ever-repeating cycles: 'Still glides the Stream, and shall for ever glide'.

Such questions of time, urgent and eternal, are not scarce across this volume; much of the author's verse is concerned with the perils of age. Sonnet No. III, which begins 'Too soon - too soon - those young affections die', provides a bleak assessment of the brevity of youth and the withering of the body and soul. Its two subsequent sonnets, however, subtitled 'Poesy', and 'Posey continued', emphasise the transformative power of poetry in restoring, at least partially, this lost sight, allowing the writer to 'light [the landscape] with his colours' once more.

Together, the three sonnets seem to take much from Wordsworth's *Ode: Intimations of Immortality from Recollections of Early Childhood*, in which he mourns the loss of the vision of youth, 'Apparelled in celestial light', but praises the powers of wisdom's 'philosophic mind' in preserving such a sense of wonder.

The volume contains some notable experiments with form and subject - found within are several sonnets drawn from classical mythos, including No. X, subtitled 'Cupid and Psyche', and No. XXI, 'A Bachante'. The volume's penultimate and final sonnets are by far the most curious, as their subjects are explicitly drawn from the poetry and dramatic works of two Spanish writers, **Lupercio Leonardo de Argensola (bap. 1559, d. 1613)** and **Fray Luis de León (1527-1591)**.







In one case of these publications, in particular, we have detected no fewer than three instances of this plagiarism; which are palmed upon the public, under fictitious signatures, as original productions'.

A rare survival of the sole edition, posthumously published, of a moralising work by government official Sir John Thoroughgood (bap. 1594?, d. 1675) revealing his orthodox Calvinism. Intended solely for distribution among the mourners at his funeral, this no doubt accounts for the paucity of surviving copies.



A rare ephemeral table displaying amendments to turnpike tolls on the road between the town of Darlington and village of West Auckland, County Durham.

The collection of tolls, nominally raised in order to defray road maintenance expenses, was overseen by numerous 'turnpike trusts', each established by an individual act of parliament.

Universally despised, and frequently corrupt, the turnpike system was eventually rendered obsolete by the rise of the railways.

In 1895 the system was discontinued, when responsibility for the roads was handed to local authorities.

The verso bears a manuscript draft of a portion (page 6) of the will of **Cornelius Harrison (d. 1806)** of Stubb House, Winston, County Durham. After Harrison's wife Anne Brunskell died in 1784 her sister Mary Kipling became his mistress. Mary is named in the will as a primary benefactor. Harrison left his youngest son Thomas £1500, though cut off his eldest, Marley, with an annuity £50 as (according to a copy of the will held at the Durham County record office) he was an 'idle wastrel' who had 'has seized the effects of his (MH's) late brother Peter Harrison in the West Indies'.

Intriguingly, the two copies of this broadside held at Senate House bear the manuscript draft of pages 4 and 10 of Harrison's will. Notably, Harrison's father, a clergyman, was a close maternal relative of Samuel Johnson.

An apparently unrecorded auction catalogue, annotated by the auctioneer with the prices achieved, of the property of a deceased wine merchant, including his 'stock in trade', lotted by bin, of sherry, port, rum, gin, and 'coniac brandy'. The sale realised a total of £268. 4s. 5d. and included 51 lots of his wine stock along with a sequence of empoty casks.

The manuscript addendum, written on the day after the public auction, adds several household as well as '21 Bottles of Currant Wine in 2 Tea Canisters'.

Interestingly, St. Albans possessed a novel wine licensing system, established under the terms of the 1570 wine charter, a model not repeated elsewhere. The borough corporation had the power to grant two licences to local vintners in return for an annual endowment of £20, remarkably to be provided to the master of St. Albans grammar school for the maintenance of the institution. We have been unable to trace Charles Williams, nor locate any record of his business. However, it does not seem unreasonable to assume that he held one of these much sought after licenses; certainly the auction catalogue reveals an extensive stock surely necessitated by the possession of a trade monopoly.
